Dear parents and carers,

Welcome to our new style parental newsletter. We have based many elements of it on the feedback we received from the recent parental survey and hope you find it a useful source of information with a focus on celebrating achievement but also keeping you up to date with life at The Priory.

We were incredibly proud of our Year 11 cohort who not only faced the return of exams but an extended exam period. Our exam invigilation team were quick to compliment them on their conduct and resilience.

As the academic year draws to a close it has been wonderful to see so many events return post COVID. Our enrichment week with a variety of activities, trips and events hopefully gave students a real sense of enjoyment beyond the classroom. Running alongside this, Year 10 ventured out into the world of work and have returned with an array of stories and a new-found appreciation of school life, compared to a day at work! We are incredibly excited about the first School Production, Chicago, in two years. I have dropped into rehearsals over the past few weeks and witnessed pupils enthusiastically pulling the last few numbers together - it promises to be one to remember. Friday 1<sup>st</sup> July saw the return of our face-to-face Charity quizzes; thank you to all who turned up. It was great to not only see parents back in the school hall but also witness friendly competition in play.

We have welcomed our new Year 6 to 7 cohort for their transition days, as well as additional weekend Funday events and a summer school, aimed at easing them into life at The Priory. It was a pleasure to meet them.

#### School site

Looking forward into the new academic year, you will notice some changes to our school site. We have responded to student, staff and parent queries around ensuring site is still welcoming but also secure, once school starts. This will involve updated gates; the main gate into the car park will remain closed at all times and the pedestrian gate will close at the beginning of the school day. If you have an appointment, then you will need to use the new intercom on either the pedestrian gates or the main gate to the car park. Pupils will also be issued with door cards to the main school buildings, they will need these to access school. Previously doors have been open at lesson change over, break and lunch but this has led to issues where students need to move between main building, and our other external buildings during lessons. It also ensures our doors are not open for 10 minute slots at the beginning and end of lessons. Pupils will need to look after these cards and wear their lanyard each day. One will be issued at the start of the year and a charge will be incurred if they need to be replaced. We will also be improving the fencing on our perimeter hedge line - if anything to prevent me having to run onto the road to retrieve the Year 7 football!

A gentle reminder that only parents of students with mobility issues, who have an arrangement in place, should be dropping pupils off on school site - please do not use the intercom to drive onto the delivery bay area at the start and end of the day as this will cause unnecessary congestion.

#### Attendance

This is an area which has received national focus, post pandemic. The government will be putting in place new legislation around expectations for pupils to attend school, every day, as we move into the next academic year. A child will dip into the persistent absenteeism bracket if attendance is below 90%. We have had a strong tradition of high attendance levels as a school thanks to your support. We will work closely with families to maintain this and highlight the impact of good attendance levels on progress and outcomes, with students as we move through the year. There will be an even greater limitation on time away during term time and I will still not be able to authorise term time holidays.

#### School events and calendar

You will have already noticed a return to trips and visits for different year groups, this will continue to build into next year. We will always attempt to strike the balance between providing a wide variety of residential and foreign trips with cost, especially within the current economic climate but there was a strong sense, from the parental body that it was important to offer these. As always, we are dependent on staff goodwill to run and organise these events, as our foreign trips will take place during school holiday time. There will not necessarily be a foreign or residential trip for every subject area.

We will be running the full complement of House events and look forward to seeing parents back to support these. In response to the majority request to return to face-to-face parents' evenings on site, these will be returning but you will also notice some informal, additional drop-in sessions with key staff. These will be themed and aimed at raising parental awareness of some of the approaches and work we undertake in school.

#### New style student planners

Your child will return home during the first week of term with a new style school planner. These have been designed in-house and will be issued each half term. Its contents directly relate to your requests in the parent survey including a greater clarity over homework, work covered, extra-curricular clubs and the school calendar. I hope you find them a useful means of communication, in addition to Arbor.

I hope you enjoy reading the rest of this newsletter. As always please get in touch if you have any queries.

Wishing you all a relaxing and well earned summer break when the time comes; school returns on Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> September.

View from the Governors

As a new addition to the newsletter, I thought it would be useful to start with what a Local Governing Body (LGB) is and what we do for The Priory School. At its heart, the LGB is the system of checks and balances on the school. We oversee the strategy and vision of the school, challenging the school leaders to ensure that the direction they, and in our case the 3-18 Education Trust that the school belongs to, have determined is appropriate to the needs of the pupils and wider local community.

The LGB consists of two governors elected from the staff of The Priory School, two governors elected from the parents and carers of pupils at the school and, currently, seven co-opted governors appointed by the Trust Board for their knowledge, skills and experience. Elected governors are appointed for a two-year term, co-opted governors for a three-year term. Governors attend meetings twice per term and are expected to visit the school occasionally.

One of our co-opted governors completes their term of office this summer so we have a vacancy from September. If you are interested in becoming a governor, helping shape the school and giving back to the community, please get in touch via our clerk (Carole.Warner@318education.co.uk). If this isn't for you but you know someone who would be ideal, then please pass on our details. We are particularly looking for someone with experience in Health and Safety, Careers or Safeguarding but the main criteria for any governor is commitment and an enquiring mind.

#### Mock Interview Day

Interviews skills are a vital life skill, students in Year 10 all took part in a mock interview with a wide range of employers to develop these skills. With their CVs in hand, students were asked a number of questions simulating an interview scenario; feedback from students was the experience was very beneficial with their positivity and exemplary conduct shining through. Employers were very complimentary about their employability skills and how well many communicated their ambitions for the future.

Some of our students took part in a 2 hour assessment centre where they faced a number of individual and team tasks, again with the aim to develop their employability skills. The challenging but very worthwhile session involved building a Lego model in teams to show success, taking part in a debate and talking for one minute about a random word. The session concluded with in-depth feedback to help students understand their strengths and areas for improvement for the future.

Another group of students also took part in a 'Getting to know you' interview preparation session delivered by the Department for Work and Pensions. This gave students the ideal build up to the interviews ensuring they were well prepared for the event by completing a number of tasks including selling a random object!

All students did themselves proud not only representing the school but also in the mature way they approached the day. So many employers commented on how well they conducted themselves and what a delight it had been to participate in the event. We look forward to holding the event again in 2023.

#### Post 16 Providers Event

Y8 and Y9 students all heard from a number of post 16 providers locally in a morning full of information designed to get them thinking about their next steps. They heard from Shrewsbury Colleges Group, Thomas Adams Sixth Form, William Brookes Sixth Form, SBC Training, Shrewsbury Town Foundation and North Shropshire College. There was something for everyone, from sport and animal based courses to apprenticeships, vocational qualifications and A levels. Whilst we are not expecting students to make their decisions yet, we hope that a taster of what is on offer will get them thinking a little more about their next steps once they leave The Priory School.

#### Visit to Shrewsbury Colleges Group

As part of thinking about life after The Priory School, a small group of Y10 students were treated to a tour of Shrewsbury Colleges Group at three campuses. The school football season is finally officially over!!!!

Our year 10 girls won the Year 10 and also the Year 11 County Cup Finals in the last few weeks (with Tamzin P being the only year 11 girl, who also scored 4 goals in the final).

In both finals, they won 8-0 and have yet again dominated County football as well as making the National Cup Semi's again this season.

Following on, our Year 8 Boys played in the Final of the County Cup. This is a competition that we have never won with a boys' team in the 17 years I have been here, with the winners historically being Thomas Telford who we knocked out in the semi-finals 1-0 with a sensational 25 yard strike from Max R. The team had not conceded throughout the tournament, however, we were playing Burton Borough who has beaten us 4-0 in the Semis of the Presidents Trophy. The County Cup is the big one, and we wanted payback!

Shrewsbury Town Astro is a big pitch giving our boys space to exploit, and 5 minutes in, Sam L did exactly that opening the scoring after breaking away from the defence and running onto a perfectly timed pass. 1-0! # We also participate in the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award is an amazing programme with three levels, bronze, silver and gold which is open to all students over the age of 14 years.

At Priory we start with Bronze usually at the start of year 10. The award is made up of four sections - volunteering, physical, skill and expedition and all these sections have to be completed to achieve the award.

The ethos of the award is for students to learn to work independently, learn new skills, challenge themselves and have fun. At Priory we organise the expedition and training but the other three sections are organised by the students themselves and completed in their own time.

Numbers for taking part has increased this year to 85 students, but we usually average 50-55. Completion rate varies however the last few groups it has been 75% achievement with some going on to take part in Gold at college. There is plenty of support and advice available in school and on the D of E website, however students need to be motivated to achieve this award.





#### Shrewsbury School Visit

Some of our Year 10 students have had the opportunity to take part in some French sessions that have been organised this term at Shrewsbury School.

These sessions have been designed to support students in tackling exam questions aimed at Grades 7,8,9 on the GCSE French paper. Students have benefited from sessions led there by Mr Yardley and Miss Higgins and were able to show off their existing French knowledge in new surroundings with different teachers.

This is something we plan to continue next term, possibly involving some Shrewsbury School students as well.



#### Biology Challenge Certificates



Some of our year 9 and 10 students have completed the International Biology Challenge. 41,000 students took part in 2 online papers to test their biology knowledge and are awarded certificates based on their score (if they didn't score in the categories, they still got a certificate for participation). Particular shout out to Matthew R. who gained Gold award (top 5% of candidates) and Ishan M. and Ruby W. who gained silver (top 10% of candidates).

There was much doubling up of parts (just like Shakespeare's Lord Chamberlain's Men theatre company would have done) so that the cast of five managed a wide number of roles, from the famous four young lovers (Hermia, Helena, Lysander and Demetrius) to the many 'Mechanicals' (workers Bottom & co.) who as amateur actors are intent on giving a performance of a tragic play – just the thing for a wedding celebration for the Duke of Athens and his new wife, Hippolyta ... (more parts!).

Apart from the mortal world there was also the magical mayhem created by the fairies (Puck and Oberon) so that Titania (Queen of the fairies) becomes enamoured of Bottom - even though he has had an ass's head conjured upon him. He doesn't know of course so much dramatic irony, humour and hee-hawing!

Many thanks to Quantum Theatre for their exuberant production. With students obviously having had less opportunity to experience live theatre in recent years, this proved an accessible and engaging performance with no slumbering possible!

Work Experience Year 10



The long awaited return to work experience finally arrived this term. Year 10 students braved the real world, and for some, had their first taste of what employment is really like. The post lockdown world made it very difficult for students to secure work experience, some pupils had to contact over 20 companies in the search for a suitable placement. I am very pleased with the effort and maturity shown by our students, it was a daunting task but they all entered into it with confidence and enthusiasm, Katie Holmes 10K reflects on her experience.

When I thought about where I would like to go to for work experience, I enjoyed the idea of going to a theatre in Birmingham or Wolverhampton or even applying to work at the BBC. Unfortunately, due to the impacts COVID 19 has had, this simply wasn't possible as many of these companies weren't accepting applicants for work experience positions. Because of this, I decided to ask Get Your Wigle On (my Musical Theatre group) if I could help at their studio for a week. I have been a member here for over seven years and it is where I spend much of my time. To my delight, they of course agreed. Having only experienced what it is like there during session times, I couldn't wait to get a hands-on experience of what goes on behind the scenes.

Over the course of my week, I had a very enriching experience working in many different areas from crafting pieces of set for their recent production of The Little Mermaid to leading activities in their young Musical Theatre classes. Working with some of their youngest members was really rewarding and I got to lead some of the drama activities during the session. It was particularly cute when one came and held my hand and said: "Welcome to Wigles!".

I am someone who naturally enjoys creating and crafting so I took a particular interest and liking to the costume aspect of my experience. Get Your Wigle On has a sister company called Spotlight Costumes which they use to allow other companies to hire their costumes for productions. They send these hires all over the country to a wide variety of different performance groups. While I was there, I had to sort three different costume hires: a Legally Blonde, an Annie, and a Matilda. This consisted of using the measurements sent by each of the companies and creating a full set of costumes for each child, whether that be a full school uniform (Matilda) or an orphan costume (Annie). Having only recently arrived, some of their new costumes which they bought for hires needed altering, so as an experienced sewer I was set to work adding ribbon hemming to school blazers for their Matilda costumes.

So, what have I taken away from my time on work experience? Well, I can certainly say that I have come away with a greater appreciation for all the hard work that all the staff put in every single day to ensure the company runs efficiently and that all their productions run smoothly. As well as this, I feel as though I have a better awareness of my time management due to often having to work against the clock with tasks such as set making and costume hires. Furthermore, I feel that I was able to demonstrate some of my strengths during the week such as: working independently; using my initiative; being part of a team and working collaboratively, and demonstrating my friendly and personable skills engaging with colleagues, parents and children of different ages. I enjoyed my time on work experience so much and it has helped cement my decision to pursue Drama and Theatre post 16.


## Visits
