## Further support/intervention, which does not carry a specific cost:

- All staff have PP students highlighted in their planners and on SIMS sheets.
- SLT learning walks have focused on progress of PP students and to check teachers know who they are.
- Student voice information is collated about the progress of PP students and attendance on trips is monitored to ensure inclusion.
- Two members of SLT have oversight of PP spending and PP student progress.
- Heads of House work with EWO and to monitor attendance of PP students school has a 96% attendance target.
- Heads of House focus specifically on PP progress
- All year 7 PP students and families met with on planning day by the Pupil Premium Champion or Pupil Premium Mentor.
