The transport and logistics sector plays a major role in the UK and global economy. Areas of work include supply chain management, passenger transport, traffic management, transport planning and the movement and supply of goods such as warehousing, road, rail, maritime and air transport.

Statistics

11,000 people work in transport and logistics across the Marches - Shropshire, Herefordshire and Telford and Wrekin - most of them are employed in either warehousing and storage (5,000 people) or freight and road transport (4,500 people).


There is a strong link between agri-food, transport and logistics. Food accounts for 50% of the total volume of outbound freight.

Several large companies involved in specialist storage and transport are linked to food and drink production in the area, and there are also smaller local freight companies specialising in chilled foods transportation.

Future trends

Technology is having an impact on roles in this sector.

Advances such as robotic warehouse pickers, e-retail, drone deliveries and driverless technologies could all have an impact on lower level roles meaning that some jobs may change.

GPS tracking, electronic signature scanners and advanced online operations have led to more roles becoming multi-skilled, making it harder to recruit.

There is demand for skilled people in areas such as ICT, warehouse management, customer service and driving; those with digital skills at all levels will also be in demand.

The sector is working hard to attract more women, and people from a wider range of backgrounds to create a more diverse workforce.

Routes into this sector

Ways to get into this sector will vary depending on the job role. National Careers Service can support you to find the right course.



Apply directly for some roles that don't ask for specific qualifications or ask for **GCSE**s - basic digital/IT skills may help. A seasonal or agency job may also be a good way in.



Choose a **college course** at level 3 (A level equivalent) or level 4 to add to your qualifications.

An **apprenticeship** could be a good route in - from warehouse operative (intermediate apprenticeship) and transport planning technician (advanced apprenticeship) to supply chain leadership professional (degree apprenticeship). Always check the requirements for each individual



apprenticeship.

For some roles, employers will look for someone who has a **university degree** but also check to see if a higher or degree apprenticeship route is an option for a graduate-level job.

Work your way up to roles such as supervisor or manager by training on the job - this can happen quickly in this sector for those who can show motivation.
