Dear Parents and Carers,

On behalf of everyone who works at The Priory, thank you for your continued support of school over the course of the academic year.

In my previous letter I alluded to a communications survey that was sent out, and in response to this, I promise to be brief and mention a few key reminders for the start of next year.

Updated toilet facilities and cloakrooms — These will be completely remodelled and updated for the start of the next academic year. Please remind your child to take everything home with them as they will need to be cleared out for work to commence.

End of school day will remain at 3pm – I mentioned in my last letter the school day would need to be extended by 5 minutes as the Government had stated it needed to be 32.5 hours per week by September 2023. Last Monday, 17th July, they retracted this and have now changed it to September 2024. We will be waiting until this date to make any changes.

Uniform – Black, pleated skirt, knee length if your child needs their skirt replacing as it has become too short (as green skirts are being phased out, all will be black from September 2024), or tailored trousers (not skinny fit, please).

Lanyards and badges – Are part of the Uniform Policy and need to be worn each day.

Long, artificial nails and jewellery – Are a health and safety concern; we have had accidents around these items this year. One pair of stud earrings only. No facial piercings.

Attendance – I cannot authorise term time holiday. We have a target of 96%, and currently sit short of this at 93%. We look forward to having everyone back in September. Thank you for your support with this.

Curriculum – Please remember this detail, which is on our website by subject and by year group.

Communications – Please follow us on social media via Twitter and Facebook (please ignore the old 2012 account which we currently cannot have removed). Please use Looking Ahead each half term to see what is happening in school. We are looking to further build on our use of Arbor but also Teams-related apps, although this needs discussion with our current providers.

Parent Survey – Thank you for your responses. We had an increased number of approximately 200 respondees this time, which was incredibly useful, and 20 responses to our Behaviour Survey. 90% of parents would recommend the school, with 90% feeling their child is happy here and 87% felt that behaviour was good or better. Areas you recommended we look at include:

- Strengthening the section in our Behaviour Policy about parents supporting school sanctions.
- Continued improvement in our communications with you. This is mixed; some say we do too little, some say too much. We will try to find a happy medium.
- Ensure our rewards strategies include a range of pupils.
- Share our work on anti-bullying with you more frequently.
- Ensure we come back to you in a timely manner.

This is just a sample of the main areas. All comments were read.

Pupil Survey – we recently carried out our annual survey with pupils:

87% say they enjoy school, 89% stated that teachers help them to do their best ,and 92% felt that the work set challenged them.

We will continue to build on moving this closer to 100% and I will share this survey with the Student Leadership Team, School Parliament, and the Student Body into next year.

A New Governor's View

It all began when I saw an advertisement in an e-mail to parents requesting volunteers to take up a school Governors role. I had heard about the Board of Governors but had a limited idea of what they did and if I would be the right sort of candidate to apply. What I did know was that I wanted to help support the school and was keen to get involved, to understand more of what goes on and to try to make a positive impact. Following a short interview process, I was offered the position and started

The role of the Local Governors Board (LGB) is to provide strategic guidance and advice to the Senior Leadership Team on policy, school plans and processes. This happens through a series of meetings with school teams and the Education Trust where policies and plans are reviewed, critiqued and where possible alternative ideas are offered to support and enhance. In this process a level of third-party auditing also takes place to act as that 'second pair of eyes' for the school leadership team.

However, the most value comes from the opportunity for governors to speak with students, acting as another voice for pupils directly into the leadership and management of the school. I have been hugely impressed when talking with pupils about their thoughts, experiences and hopes around school life. Their unique insight to the work put into the school is invaluable and what I like most is how they can offer solutions and ideas to challenges which we, as adults, may not have thought of.

It is during Pupil Voice sessions that the feelings of pride, ownership and belonging really come out from those we speak with. It is representing these views and thoughts during both LGB meetings but also Link roles where we as Governors can make a real difference. Being able to use a first-hand example provided to me during Pupil Voice to highlight how a process or policy could be improved is invaluable. What is also rewarding is when an idea that pupils have suggested has been taken forward and an aspect of school life can be changed in a positive way as a result of the sharing of ideas at all levels.

Although only eight months into the role, I feel every meeting and every visit is a learning experience and broadens me personally. Having not come from an education background and my profession being as far from secondary education as you can imagine, I have been pleasantly surprised by how much my broader experience adds to the wider meetings and discussions, and how much I am able to take back into my profession too.

I am still at the beginning of my Governor's journey, but I would recommend it to anyone who feels they want to positively affect the school and those who attend. You will be surprised with what you take away from this rewarding role.



The Yoto Carnegie Book Prize

We had a special after-school book club this term, to celebrate the Yoto Carnegie Book Prize winner. Also in attendance was Priory alumni and local author Judy Arlett. The Yoto Carnegies are the UK's longest running and best-loved children's book awards, recognising outstanding reading experiences created through writing and illustration in books for children and young people. The Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing is awarded by children's librarians for an outstanding book written in English for children and young people. We looked at each book shortlisted and voted for our overall favourite. Whilst the official winner was declared *The Blue Book of Nebo by Manon Steffan Ros*, our book club opted instead for *The Eternal Return of Clara Hart by Louise Finch*. Both come highly recommended and are available in the school library to borrow now, alongside all the other shortlisted titles!

Book Face Competition



This includes making sure that all of the fire fighting equipment is fit for purpose, emergency lighting works, fire escapes are clear, and fire doors working. We monitor water temperature and keep records to ensure legionella is kept at bay.

We take deliveries and ensure site visitors comply with our safety protocols. We stack chairs, we unstack chairs, and we set up rooms for the various events and meetings within the school calendar. The compliance documentation demands are a daily responsibility and we have a legal obligation to maintain records accurately.




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
