Dear parents and carers,

When I wrote to you soon after they left us, I highlighted just how well supported we were by you but also how well school ran during the two days. I am unsure how successful we will be, but I, my leadership team, the Trust and the Governors will fight for a fair report. At this stage I am not permitted by Ofsted to share any more with you. There will no doubt be many rumours circulating. I would ask that should any speculation reach you, it is put to one side and that you continue to support us over the coming period as we will need a united front. Once I am able to share more with you, I will.




Our McMillan Coffee Morning was a huge success, and of course Remembrance Day raised money for the Royal British Legion.

### FAQ: Free School Meals in Relation to Lunch Accounts

When a student has Free School Meals, they are allocated £2.40 per day for this. This amount is credited to their lunch account and does not roll over to the next day if any of that amount is not spent.

The £2.40 covers the lunch deal, but the money itself is not 'reserved' for this. What this means is that if snacks are bought at break time, this will be taken from the £2.40 Free School Meals amount, resulting in there not being enough of that allocated money left to cover a free lunch.

In addition to this, if you put money on your child's lunch account to cover snacks/additional food and they purchase these snacks before lunch, this will be taken from the £2.40 Free School Meals amount and not the money that you've put on the account. This is because any food purchases come off the Free School Meals amount <u>first</u>, before any additional credit you have added.

We hope this helps to clarify the way Free School Meals works in relation to lunch accounts.

# GCHQ National Language Competition 2023

Over two days in November, Year 9 enjoyed time dedicated to finding out about GCHQ, the UK's intelligence, security and cyber agency. Students learnt why languages such as Arabic, Russian and Mandarin are so important to GCHQ and how it is possible to learn these languages from scratch at university if you have studied French or Spanish at GCSE and A Level. They learnt new information such as how globally Mandarin has the largest amount of native speakers, Russia is spread over one-seventh of the earth and Arabic is an official language in 22 countries around the world.

Students then experimented with these new (and tricky!) languages, learning some sounds, vocabulary and phrases. Finally, they all took part online in the GCHQ National Languages Competition 2023, which focused on code breaking and pattern spotting to give them a taste of what it might be like to work at GCHQ intercepting and interpreting a variety of coded information. The winners will get a very rare opportunity to have a look around the GCHQ Headquarters in Cheltenham so we are keeping our fingers crossed!


In the cold weather, our lovely canteen staff have offered warm puddings served with custard and hot fillings at the Deli Bar!

The students were impressed by the lecture hall when we walked in, which is an experience in itself, and were then thrown immediately into a maths quiz for the first part of the day (at the end of the day we found that the team of Belle Raaff, Maisie Jones and Niamh Humphreys-Clowes came third in the maths competition, against some really high-class opponents, so a huge congratulations to them)!

The day was broken up in the different lecture halls and seminar rooms, and we looked at maths, statistics and economics, where students had the chance to work with other groups from other schools.


