Dear parents and carers,

It's certainly been a busy half term. You will see from reading the rest of the newsletter that school has been busy in terms of events and activities for pupils. This includes our school production Oliver on the last two days of half term – I hope to see many of you there. Additionally, we had our continued Ofsted inspection. I am hopeful I will have a final report before half term (it may have already reached you by the time you read this!). It has been an incredibly challenging time for staff in school and we have appreciated your support. Although we are very pleased with the way in which the final team gained a through insight into life at The Priory, with a very personalized and well rounded commentary, it is a shame that it took a robust challenge of the initial visit, to get to this point. The number of parents and carers who contacted me to lend their support was overwhelming. Whilst it is always important to have an external lens there does need to be trust in the way in which the process is carried out, we felt this was the case with the visit in January. However, it is still just a snapshot into everything a school does on a daily basis and we were heartened by the overriding feeling from the parental body that the view of Ofsted was not the primary factor in judging the provision for your child. Myself and my staff are looking forward to being able to move forwards with this sentiment in mind.

Key areas to note:

- If your child has a medical or dental appointment we would always urge you to try to arrange this outside of school time. However, where this is not possible you do need to request their absence, in writing, in advance with confirmation of the appointment. We have an increasing number of pupils asking to sign out but we have had no verification from parents around the reasons for this. If they are attending a medical appointment before 3pm we do need someone to collect them for safeguarding purposes.
- There are a number of Year 11 attending interviews at sixth form provision. Again, we need confirmation from parents so we can verify where pupils are going, if their interview is before 3pm. We understand in this case that some of these older pupils will make their own way there especially if it is at Shrewsbury Colleges Group.
- Uniform reminders. I confirmed, last year that the skirt FOR ALL PUPILS AND YEAR GROUPS will change from green to the black pleated style (it must fit the style on the school website and must have permanent pleats, not a straight style). This change will come into place from September 2024. I will remind again, next term. This can be purchased from the School Shop uniform providers but also any high street chain or supermarket. The black school trousers are an option for anyone, as are tailored shorts. Leggings are not part of the school uniform. Uniform infringements do incur a school sanction. If there are any issues a note from home must be provided but will only cover two days.
- Request from Lakeland coach company to not park in the bus stop opposite school as bus services are finding it difficult to pull in for passengers to board and alight.

I hope you find the information in the newsletter useful and informative.

FAQ: Free School Meals in Relation to Lunch Accounts

When a student has Free School Meals, they are allocated £2.40 per day for this. This amount is credited to their lunch account and does not roll over to the next day if any of that amount is not spent.

The £2.40 covers the lunch deal, but the money itself is not 'reserved' for this. What this means is that if snacks are bought at break time, this will be taken from the £2.40 Free School Meals amount, resulting in there not being enough of that allocated money left to cover a free lunch.

In addition to this, if you put money on your child's lunch account to cover snacks/additional food and they purchase these snacks before lunch, this will be taken from the £2.40 Free School Meals amount and not the money that you've put on the account. This is because any food purchases come off the Free School Meals amount <u>first</u>, before any additional credit you have added.

We hope this helps to clarify the way Free School Meals works in relation to lunch accounts.


Holocaust Memorial Day 2024

On Friday 26th January, author Natalie Cumming visited The Priory School to share with students the story of her family and the importance of commemorating Holocaust Memorial Day. On the anniversary of the liberation of the concentration camp at Auschwitz-Birkenau, people from across the United Kingdom and the world remember the six million Jewish men, women, and children who were murdered during the Holocaust, alongside the millions of other people killed under Nazi persecution, and those killed in other genocides such as in Rwanda, Srebrenica, and Cambodia.

Students had already seen a video of Natalie's appearance on 'The Repair Shop' with her aunt's violin. During her talk, Natalie explained that the violin had originally belonged to her grandfather, who had escaped religious persecution in Russia following the communist revolution in 1917. The violin passed to Natalie's Aunt Rosa, a gifted musician, who was invited to play for the Berlin Symphony. However, following the rise of the Nazis, Rosa was arrested and sent to Auschwitz. Luckily, the violin proved to be her lifeline, as she was forced to perform in the camp and deemed necessary to be kept alive. Unfortunately, Rosa died in 1947, but not before she could pass on her story to Natalie and the violin to Natalie's father.

In a recent message, HM The King explained the importance of the work of people such as Natalie:

The theme for Holocaust Memorial Day 2024 is the Fragility of Freedom, a stark reminder to us all how freedom can so easily be lost when it is taken for granted, and how crucial it is, therefore, to learn from those who bear witness to the horrors of the Holocaust and all genocides. Tragically, we live in a world where violence and acts of unspeakable cruelty are still perpetrated against people for no other reason than their religion, their race or their beliefs. In recommitting ourselves to remembering the horrors of the past, we take an important step in creating a safer, freer world today and for future genera-
