# Headteacher's Letter

### ear parents and carers,

It's hard to believe that another academic year is drawing to a close and what a year it has been! On behalf of all of the staff in school, thank you for your engagement and support, especially during our extended Ofsted experience earlier on in the year but also in relation to the responses I have received since my update on the financial challenges facing school.

### Important reminders, updates and changes

### Length of the school day change

As mentioned in my previous letter, we are having to extend the school day by five minutes to meet statutory requirements which come into place from the new academic year. I outlined the reasons why we were looking to place this at the start of the day; to allow for more settling time with tutors, checks to ensure pupils have come to school ready to learn with every thing they need but also to build those relationships between tutor and child. We have decided to confirm this option.

Morning registration will now start at 8.30am, so pupils need to be on site at 8.25am at the very latest to give them time to make their way to their tutor room. This model means that lesson times stay the same, as does the end of the day. This will avoid a clash with Meole Brace school's exit and the impact this would have on traffic on Longden road.

### School Uniform changes and reminders

If your child chooses to wear a skirt it MUST be the black, permanent pleat style as displayed on the school website, for ALL year groups. Not lycra, straight or pencil cut or 4-pleat in design. Please check the photographs if you are unsure as school sanctions apply for anyone not wearing the correct uniform. This does not have to be the version from the School Shop supplier, it can be bought from any supermarket or High Street chain, as a more affordable option. Tailored school trousers and tailored shorts are still an alternative option for all.

Jewellery – one pair of stud earrings, no others. Clear piercings should not be encouraged as they would need to be removed for health and safety elements of PE, along with more visible piercings. Please do not allow your child to have any additional piercings at the end of the holiday period, due to the healing time needed before school starts.

Artificial nails – these are not permitted due to the increased likelihood of accidents in PE but also hygiene in subjects such as Food Technology. We have had some nasty incidents of nail beds detaching when the nails have been caught or bent. They need to be removed before coming into school.

Lanyards – must be kept over the school holidays and re-worn. New ones are not issued in September. The must be worn daily as part of the school uniform.

### **Active Travel**

To ease congestion along Bank Farm Road and Longden Road, wherever possible please encourage your child to cycle or walk to school. If you are collecting or dropping off your child, please do not park in any of the bus stops as we have received numerous complaints from bus companies that they have not been able to safely drop off or pick up passengers. Likewise, please do not park across the drives of local residents.

### Dropping off on school site

The only parents who should be picking up and dropping off on school site are those whose children have mobility needs and have a special pass. From September we will be asking these parents to pick up from the barrier, just past the school gate. There may be exceptional, one-off circumstances, for example if your child has become very unwell where the reception team will give you access through the school gates. This is for health and safety reasons as pupils need to walk across these areas to access classrooms and play areas from 8am onwards.

### **Mobile Phones**

A reminder that our policy is that they 'must not be seen and must not be heard' within the school building at any point. We will be reinforcing this again with pupils as they need to ensure they have exited any building before their phones are taken out and switched on, rather than it being acceptable for them to be out as soon as it is 3pm. We need to ensure school remains a safe place, away from the influences of social media. If your child urgently needs to get in touch with you or needs collecting, please remind them to come to school reception where we will facilitate this. Please do not text or message your child during the school day. Mobile phones will be confiscated if they are seen or heard and a detention will be issued.

### Staffing changes

A reminder that Mr Stacey is temporarily

stepping down as Head of English, with Mr Dalgarno taking over the position from September.

Mr Byrne will be taking on the post of Head of Attenborough House during this interim period.

Mrs Wassall is taking on further roles within her Higher-Level Teaching Assistant position so will no longer be school matron. First Aid responsibility will now be on a rota of staff, primarily led by the admin team within the school office. A gentle reminder that staff are trained in the administration of First Aid but are not medically qualified.

If your child feels unwell or has an injury, they should report to school's main reception. Notifications will still be sent home via Arbor.

As per my previous correspondence we will no longer have additional Maths and English support from our departmental intervention mentors.

Clare Revans and Joanna Biggs will be leaving us from student support. Clare will be starting her teacher training and Joanna is moving on to work with the local authority inclusion team – we wish them both every success.

As outlined in my letter, this term we will not be replacing Clare; Joanna's replacement will not work with pupils around interventions but will manage our internal exclusion room. Our student support team will continue to include Liz Tinsley, Lizzie Robey and Nicole Emery.

As mentioned previously, Mrs Turner will only be working in D4 for three days per week which will limit the use of personalised timetable to support attendance.

Behaviour policy and detentions reminder
As per the Department for Education's Behaviour guidance we do not need to request
your consent for your child to attend a detention but we will inform you if they need to
attend a detention after school so you can
arrange for them to be collected, if needed. Please log into Arbor regularly so you can
make the necessary arrangements if your
child receives a detention. Due to staffing
constraints, we will not be able to rearrange
detentions, especially School Detentions with
the Senior Leadership Team, as these need to
happen on a Friday.

Learning Engagement team

We are moving to a re-branding of our student support and learning support/Support Hub to Learning Engagement, for next year. The main change is something we have shifted to this year. Students cannot attend Student Support in D5 on a drop in basis apart from break and lunchtime. **Any time in** D5 or D4, during lesson time, is by appointment ONLY. Pupils need to be in lessons and cannot take themselves to student support at any other time. This is incredibly important to move away from the pattern where pupils try to avoid lessons; this is something that has affected schools nationally. We have not been as affected as other schools and are keen to keep it like this. The focus will be reengaging pupils with their learning, in the classroom. If a child is anxious, this will be the focus of the Student Support team.

Newsletter

I have received feedback on the school newsletter over the course of the academic year from staff, parents and pupils. While everyone has enjoyed seeing pupils being celebrated, the general consensus is that the newsletter has become too long and therefore, people have stopped reading it. We have increased our use of social media this term and will be using our Facebook page as the main

method of highlighting school achievements. Letters from myself will continue to come to you by email/Arbor but they will also be linked on the school website and social media pages.



FAQ: Free School Meals in Relation to Lunch Accounts

When a student has Free School Meals, they are allocated £2.40 per day for this. This amount is credited to their lunch account and does not roll over to the next day if any of that amount is not spent.

The £2.40 covers the lunch deal, but the money itself is not 'reserved' for this. What this means is that if snacks are bought at break time, this will be taken from the £2.40 Free School Meals amount, resulting in there not being enough of that allocated money left to cover a free lunch.

In addition to this, if you put money on your child's lunch account to cover snacks/additional food and they purchase these snacks before lunch, this will be taken from the £2.40 Free School Meals amount and not the money that you've put on the account. This is because any food purchases come off the Free School Meals amount <u>first</u>, before any additional credit you have added.



We hope this helps to clarify the way Free School Meals works in relation to lunch accounts.







# 440 Geography Trip






# 19 STELL CHALLENGE

At a launch event on Tuesday 16th July, Early Help professionals from Shropshire Council and partners across health, education and the voluntary and community sector came together to celebrate the new strategy, which aims to give children, parents and carers the right help at the right time.

Early Help services aim to provide families with the most suitable type of support for their needs at the earliest possible stage, to stop issues from

escalating into more serious problems. Support can involve advice on parenting, behavior, absences from school, drug and alcohol misuse and much more.

Working with families to resolve concerns right at the beginning helps them to become independent and resilient, avoiding crisis and more disruptive intervention that can also be costly for the council.

In addition we have a regular programme of **Multi-agency Early Help Training**. All our training is available to agencies working with families in Shropshire and is FREE to attend. You can find out what Early Help in Shropshire means for you and the families you work with, increase your confidence when talking with young people or families, develop your skills and learn about the tools are available to assist you working with children, young people or their families.

### Summer Holiday Fun in Shropshire


Have fun with your friends, learn new skills, gain confidence and get involved!

There are free places available on the programme for children and young people aged 4 (in reception class or equivalent) to 16, who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals.

There are a limited number of free places available for children and young people who are not in receipt of benefits-related free school meals but meet a wider eligibility criterion (see www.shropshire.gov.uk.haf / email HAF.programme@shropshire.gov.uk for more details).

- If your child/ren has SEND (Special Educational Needs & Disabilities) or receives any extra help at school, before booking onto activity, please contact the holiday club to discuss your child/s needs.

The unique code entitles your child/ren to attend 16 sessions of free holiday activity in Shropshire during the summer holidays 2024. Please don't use this code to book onto more than 16 sessions of activity or to book onto multiple programmes of activity with different providers, happening at the


